The meals and snacks served meet standards set by USDA. Meals are provided at no separate charge,

and are available to all children without regard to race, sex, color, disability, age, or national origin.

The amount of reimbursement received by the Child and Adult Care Food Program Sponsor (At-Risk Afterschool Care Center Component) is based upon the "free" rate of CACFP reimbursement.
