Mount Pleasant, SC – The Constituent District Two School Board continues to receive information concerning current student enrollment and projections for growth within D2. Elementary and middle school zones were reestablished and implemented for the 2015-16 school year. During this phase of the rezoning process, the board voted to delay an area between Coleman Boulevard and Shem Creek proposed to go to Mount Pleasant Academy until the 2017-18 school year.

The following neighborhoods will be rezoned from Mamie Whitesides Elementary School to Mount Pleasant Academy *effective August 2017*.

The board will continue monitoring residential development in District 2 and enrollment in schools. School attendance zones will be adjusted as the community continues to grow to ensure balanced school populations.
