Roshon R. Bradley, Ed.D. Named Principal of Sanders-Clyde Creative Arts

Charleston, SC — Charleston County School District (CCSD) is proud to announce Dr. Roshon Bradley as Principal of Sanders-Clyde Creative Arts School, which serves students in grades K-8. Bradley has served as Interim Principal at Sanders-Clyde since March 2017.

Bradley began his career as a school counselor at Clinton Avenue Learning Center in Rochester, where he was hired to work with at-risk students in an urban environment. Two years later, Bradley was promoted to Assistant Principal at Lewis H. Morgan School, where he served for a year before taking the assistant principalship at Martin B. Anderson School for the next three years. In 2007, Bradley became the principal of Kodak Park School, and later an early childhood school in the area, where he served until joining the District this year.

Bradley has expertise in the areas of instructional design and development, school-based budgeting and administration, organization building and strategic planning, behavior management through progressive intervention and discipline, grant writing, facilities management, and fundraising and community partnerships.

Bradley holds a Bachelor of Science in Sociology and a Master of Science in Counseling Education from the University of Buffalo. He also holds a Master of Science in Educational Administration and a Doctor of Education and Executive Leadership from St. John Fisher College.
